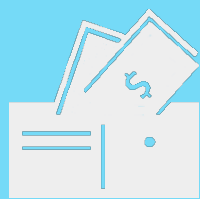


PRICED OUT IN **THE UNITED STATES**

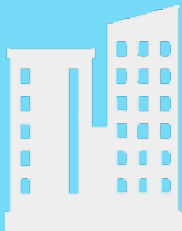

TAC's *Priced Out* report documents the severe, nationwide shortage of affordable rental housing for millions of adults with disabilities who receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI). Without access to safe and affordable housing, too many people are forced into segregated and costly institutional settings — or homelessness.

There are many proven solutions to this crisis. First and foremost, disability advocates must unite in the call to fully support federal rental assistance programs. Use the *Priced Out* report to advocate for:

- Housing programs in your area that include preferences for people with disabilities — including those who are homeless or coming from institutions.
- Full federal funding for HUD housing programs and the expansion of permanent supportive housing through Section 811 PRA, HEARTH, and vouchers for people with disabilities.
- The use of National Housing Trust Fund allocations to support permanent supportive housing for people with disabilities in your state.
- Coverage by Medicaid and other sources for services that support successful tenancy.
